

PARK RULES

- Park Hours 8:00am - Sunset
- Park and Drive in Designated Areas Only
- All animals must be under physical control with leash or lead at all times.
- Plants, animals, artifacts, and facilities are for everyone to enjoy. Do not deface, remove or destroy.
- The following are prohibited:
 - Alcoholic Beverages
 - Swimming
 - Individual Camping
 - Littering
 - Feeding, harassing, hunting and trapping of Wildlife
 - All Weapons
 - Fires (except in grills at designated Picnic Areas)
 - Commercial Activity (except by permit)
- Special Use Permits may be obtained. For information please call 770-920-7129.
- Parks are provided and maintained for your enjoyment by Douglas County Parks and Recreation. Please help keep your parks safe and clean.
- All other Park Rules apply.

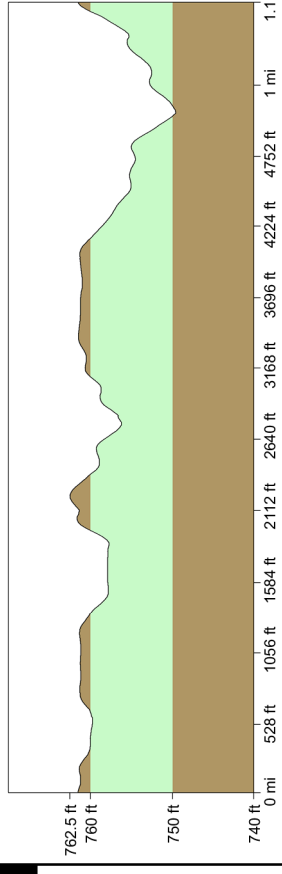
TRAIL RULES

- Stay on designated trails only. Observe trail closure notices. Use of some trails may be prohibited.

- Some trails may be lengthy and strenuous.
- Please refrain from smoking on the trails.
- Leave NO Trace. Pack it in and pack it out.

BOUNDARY WATERS PARK

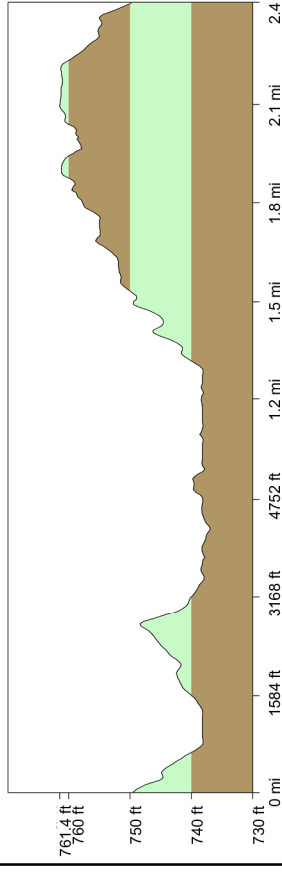
Boundary Waters is our newest Park in Douglas County which consists of 500 acres of active and passive areas. The Park offers recreational opportunities including hiking, picnicking, fishing, athletic and aquatic facilities. You will be able to access restrooms, drinks and snacks at the Aquatic Center and restroom facilities at the Sports Complex.

The trails are open from 8:00 am until dark. The trailheads are located at the parking lot behind the Aquatic Center and at the double gates.



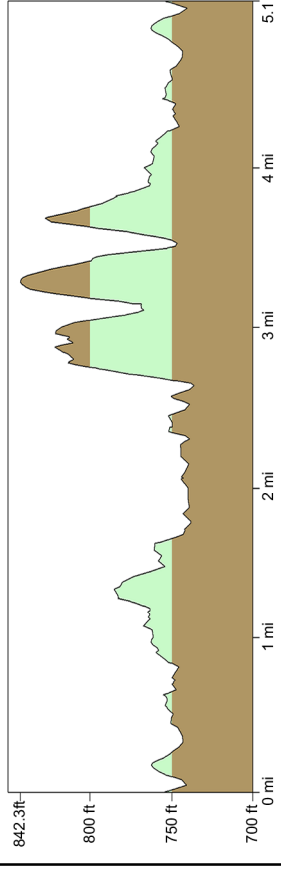
RED HAWK LOOP (BLUE TRAIL)

The Blue Trail is an easy to moderate trail. Enter at the parking lot behind the Aquatic Center. Lake is on your left. Trail is approximately 1.1 miles long. Good choice for seniors or mothers with small children. Slightly shaded. Access the picnic area from this trail.



RED OAK LOOP (YELLOW TRAIL)

The Yellow Trail is a moderate trail with a steady incline in some areas. Length of the trail is 2.4 miles. Rest at the covered bridge. A huge Southern Red Oak, one of the largest trees on the property, can be viewed on this trail. The yellow trail can also be accessed off of the blue trail. Viewing area for many animals such as deer and turkey. The trees cover the forest with a beautiful canopy of green.



CHATTAHOOCHEE LOOP (RED TRAIL)

The Red Trail has rugged terrain and at 5.1 miles in length, it is the longest and most strenuous trail in the park. The main trailhead starts behind the football field. The red trail can also be accessed off of the blue and yellow trail. You will also have a great view of the Chattahoochee River. This trail overlooks the baseball fields and includes: heavily shaded pine trees, swamp land, steep inclines and slopes, and is the longest trail.
